From the Principal



Term 3 has commenced beautifully at Boyup Brook District High School, and it was wonderful to welcome students back from their holiday break. It was lovely to hear stories of adventures near and far, including trips to Exmouth, Shark Bay and Bali, as well as plenty of time spent relaxing and recharging. We are also delighted to welcome new students and families who have joined us across both the primary and high school sites. A special welcome to Mr Mearns, who joins our team as the Year 4/5 classroom teacher—it's great to have you on board!

Over the school holidays, the primary school library received a fresh coat of paint, giving it a clean and vibrant new look. New furniture is on the way, and we look forward to unveiling the updated space in the coming weeks. In addition, many of the ceilings across the high school site were replaced, improving both the acoustics and overall aesthetics of the buildings. You may also have noticed changes to the Barron Street car park at the primary school, as outlined further in the newsletter.

Staff returned on the Monday for a School Development Day focused on professional learning and alignment with our school priorities. The day included a deep dive into our Strategic Direction, the launch of our new Peer Observation framework to complement performance and

development cycles, and an introduction to the TAPPLE strategy—our latest evidence-based teaching practice. Staff also collaborated to develop consistent school practices across K–10 and explored the Circle of Control to support wellbeing. It was a full and productive day of professional growth.

Our secondary students have jumped into their learning this term with fresh energy. Year 9 and 10 students have re-selected their elective subjects, with this semester's offerings including Physical Recreation, STEM, and Metalwork and Mechanics. Meanwhile, Year 7 and 8 students have begun the Farm Skills program, engaging in practical, hands-on learning experiences that connect with our local context and school farm program.

Our primary classrooms are also buzzing with purposeful learning as students settle into their new topics for the term. We are looking forward to welcoming families onsite next week for our Term 3 Learning Journey on Thursday, 7 August—an opportunity for students to proudly share their learning and celebrate the progress they've made so far this year.

Finally, earlier this week Miss Shields, Miss Carroll and I travelled to Perth to attend the latest Fogarty EDvance workshop. As part of the experience, we visited several high-performing schools where we observed high-impact teaching in action and spoke with school leaders about their improvement journeys. These visits provided valuable insights and inspiration, which we look forward to sharing with our staff as we continue to strengthen our own school improvement efforts.

Welcome back to what promises to be another exciting and jam-packed term!

High school students have returned with enthusiasm, diving into new content across their MESH subjects (Mathematics, English, Science, and HASS). Elective selections have now been finalised, and our Year 7/8 students are engaging in their second round of "taster" classes—an excellent opportunity to explore a variety of subjects and begin thinking about future pathways and elective choices in Year 9.

Students in Years 9 and 10 are continuing their progress through their selected certificate courses. A special congratulations to Yazmine and Mason, our Year 10 Sport and Recreation students, who successfully completed their First Aid Certificates last term through the Boyup Brook St John Sub-Centre. Your dedication and outstanding conduct were highly praised—well done!

Our Agriculture students are actively maintaining the school farm and using photographs to support their online assessment submissions. Meanwhile, in Digital Technologies, students are preparing to enhance their IT skills with hands-on drone technology—an exciting and innovative addition to their learning.

Our Year 10 Workplace Skills students are also gaining valuable experience through weekly placements at the primary school. Under the guidance of Mrs Beatty and Miss Davies, Mylee and Lillie are exploring the world of Early Childhood Education. We look forward to seeing them flourish in these roles.

I'm excited to continue the *Deputy Principal's Award* this term—a new initiative introduced this year to recognise outstanding student achievements. Staff will continue to nominate students, and I look forward to celebrating as many of our high school students as possible throughout the term.

In Week 4, high school students will have the opportunity to attend *Yirra Yaakin's* cultural performance, *Kaarla Kaatijin*—meaning "to understand fire" in the Noongar language. This production shares Indigenous creation stories from the Perth region and explores the cultural and spiritual significance of fire in Noongar traditions. The performance will take place on Monday, 11 August, and I strongly encourage all students to take part in this special cultural experience.

Looking ahead, preparations are in full swing for Country Week in Week 10. Further information—including the itinerary and associated costs—will be shared in the coming weeks. Country Week is a fantastic opportunity for students to represent our school, strengthen teamwork skills, and create lasting memories.

Fogarty EDvance Program

This week, our Senior Leadership Team attended the latest Fogarty EDvance workshop in Perth. Day one focused on key leadership practices, including instructional coaching, running effective discussions, drafting school KPIs, and shaping a clear change story to support our improvement journey.

On day two, they visited high-performing schools—Hammond Park Secondary College and Dawson Park Primary School—to observe high-impact teaching strategies in action and learn from their leadership teams. These experiences provided valuable insights that will help guide our ongoing work at BBDHS.

Primary School Car Park Change – Student Safety First

At Boyup Brook District High School, the safety of our students is always our highest priority. In response to concerns about students walking through the Barron Street car park while entering the school or getting on and off buses, we have made an important change to how this area is used.

From this term onwards, the Barron Street car park will be reserved for Admin staff and staff who need to move regularly between the primary and high school sites throughout the day. Additionally, the length of the car park has been reduced, with the far end now designated as a dedicated space for student bus lines and a safe walkway.

This change has been introduced to significantly reduce vehicle traffic in this area during peak times and ensure students can move safely and confidently through this space.

Thank you to all families, staff, and visitors for your support in making our school a safer place for everyone.



Primary School Learning Journey

We warmly invite all families, of students in Kindergarten to Year 6, to our Primary Learning Journey, taking place on **Thursday 7 August from 3:15pm to 5:15pm**.

This event is a celebration of student learning and an opportunity for your child to proudly share the progress they have made so far this year. The Learning Journey strengthens the connection between home and school and encourages student reflection, ownership, and goal setting.

Students will guide their families through their classroom, showcasing their work, explaining their learning, and highlighting their achievements. Teachers will be present to welcome families and support students, but there will be no formal presentations—this is a student-led experience.

As part of this year's Learning Journey, students may also share a simple personal reflection or goal—such as one academic and one personal or social goal. This element encourages students to think about what they're proud of and what they might like to focus on next, particularly in light of their school reports which will be emailed home in Week 10. Families are invited to be part of this process by discussing these reflections with their child, offering feedback, and supporting the setting of a new goal for the term ahead.

Families are welcome to attend at any time between 3:15pm and 5:15pm.

We look forward to seeing you there and celebrating the learning and growth of our students together.

The children have thrown themselves into lots of fun new learning experiences and are already achieving so much.

We began our new Talk for Writing unit with the delightful story *Little Charlie*. The children have thoroughly enjoyed experimenting with sentence innovations, taking ideas from the story and creating their own imaginative sentences. It's been a fantastic way to build their language skills while sparking creativity.

In Maths, we've been practicing counting and writing numbers up to 20. A big focus has been on counting each item carefully, just once—a key skill they're really starting to master. It's wonderful to see their confidence with numbers growing every day.

This Monday was extra special as we celebrated 100 Days of School! The classroom was bursting with colourful costumes and big smiles as we marked this exciting milestone. It was a perfect opportunity to reflect on all the amazing things our Pre-Primary students have learned and achieved so far this year.


We've also begun exploring Technologies, learning about digital devices and the hardware we use in everyday life. The children are becoming more aware of the technology all around them, which is so exciting to see.

We're incredibly proud of how beautifully the children have settled into Term 3 and can't wait to see what other wonderful learning adventures await us in the weeks ahead!























High School Physical Education

This term in High School Physical Education, our focus will be on the three sports we are competing in at this year's Country Week: Futsal, Netball and Basketball. This performance will give students the opportunity to showcase not only their singing abilities but also their sense of respect and reflection.

Lower Primary Music Classes

Our Lower Primary students have been busy learning how to sing and play simple songs on the ukulele. They've enjoyed transferring the melodies they sing into notes on the instrument, developing both their aural and practical skills. We've also been learning how to read basic musical notation, focusing on the difference between beat and rhythm, and have introduced the Italian music terms for "getting louder" (crescendo) and "getting softer" (decrescendo). The children have been so engaged and it's exciting to see their confidence and musical understanding grow each week.

Upper Primary Music

In Upper Primary, students have taken their ukulele skills to the next level by starting to write their own original songs. This has been a fantastic way to blend creativity with their technical

skills. They are also working on consolidating their ability to play the C chord and A minor chord smoothly and confidently. We're looking forward to hearing the final versions of their compositions later in the term!

Year 7 & 8 Music

A brand-new semester brings a fresh start for our Year 7 and 8 music students. In their first lessons last week, they were introduced to the instruments they'll be playing this term and quickly started building their confidence. It's been great to see how well they've already adapted and how eager they are to develop their skills further.


Year 9 & 10 Music (School of Rock)

Science Week 2025


Join Us for Our Whole School Science Week Celebration!


Book Week 2025


